### Vicar's Letter written by Rev Kate Szejnmann – Associate Priest

It was such a joy to be part of and witness three new baptisms and three baptism renewals for those affirming faith at last Sunday's Pentecost service. God is really moving in the lives of his church!

As we build up a picture of Pentecost, we must endeavour to give focus to the Holy Spirit whose most prominent feature is to bring about change, healing and transformation. Unlike in the Old Testament, where the people of God were reliant of a few Spirit-filled charismatic or even scary prophets, it is reversed here in the New Testament account of Pentecost, whereby the people of God are

directly filled with the Holy Spirit, given the authority to heal and proclaim the Gospel and be catalysts for Gods mission.

Sunday's Gospel story (John 4.7-15) was of an encounter with an ordinary woman who meets Jesus by a watering whole. It changes her life. At the well we see how Jesus opens-up a conversation with this Samaritan outcast. A woman who, because of her reputation, comes by in the heat of the day to get water. A woman who gets her purpose in life from numerous partners and from sexual relationships – and a trail of many husbands. She would be known as a 'harlot', a jezebel, a sinner beyond repair. Jesus has other motives. Jesus is relaxed and unjudging.

Jesus offers her a different source of life: Living water that would spring up within her to eternal life. Jesus offers a free gift that can't be earnt or paid for. Living water: That is the Spirit; God. He offers love, grace, mercy, compassion, acceptance, forgiveness, time. He is the embodiment of the good news. And her response is that she 'would like this, that she is thirsty for this'. Jesus diverts the conversation. He knows all about her past, her weaknesses, and yet in this personal conversation, he doesn't condemn her. He is kind and tender but doesn't mince his words; he is direct. Her heart starts to turn.



Jesus talks of a time when all will be saved because of him, Samaritans, unbelievers, all tribes and nations when all will worship in Spirit and Truth. The woman responds by saying 'I know a time when the Messiah is coming.' Christ says, 'I who speak to you, am he.' The woman runs to her village and shares everything she has encountered. That she met a man who knew all about her. They invite him to the village and the whole village comes to faith.

Such a beautiful encounter from a God who initiates an intentional conversation to open hearts. He is a God who chases us down in love. 'Most religions', theologian Timothy Keller says, 'have a leader who says 'I am here to help you find God.' In Christianity, Jesus says, 'I am God and have come to find you.'

Jesus came to find her. John 3.16: "God so loved the world that he sent his only son, that whoever believes in him will not perish, but have eternal life."

Are you thirsty for living eternal water? Full cup or half empty? Could you imagine a God who loves you so much and pursues you so he can love you and forgive you, and take off the burdens



you carry? A saviour who wants to be with you always and fill you with the free gift of life, the Holy Spirit.

Jesus says, 'I am God and have come to find you.' Will you go on a journey of being 'found' by God and being full of his presence? Then pray......

### Churches enjoyed bumper Easter attendances

Clergy have reported packed services over Easter, as increasing numbers of young people are coming to church.

It follows the recent survey by the Bible Society, which found that the share of the population who attend a service a month has risen from eight per cent in 2018 to 12 per cent last year. But surprisingly, the figures for those aged 18 to The Bible Society survey also found that 24 have *quadrupled*, to 16 per cent.

Philip North, Bishop of Blackburn, said that the numbers at services were up by as much as a half in some areas. He said that, despite so much recent bad publicity about the Church, "there is such a hunger for faith, especially among the young."

The rector at one church in London said: "The world is a much more frightening and chaotic place than when I was growing up. People in their 20s and 30s have had two major financial

crashes, a pandemic, a land war in Europe, a housing crisis. The world is not a place for optimism right now. The stability and comfort that God can provide is something that appeals to young people."

Churches certainly provide a sense of community, a social network as well as a spiritual one, which can help young people who are struggling to connect with others.

Catholics may become the largest denomination in Britain, for the first time in 500 years. Anglicanism, on the other hand, could fall behind Pentecostalism, and become the UK's third largest denomination.

The Anglican share of regular churchgoers of all ages fell from 41 per cent in 2018 to 34 per cent in 2024, while at the same time the Catholic share rose from 23 per cent to 31 per cent.

### Ordination season is underway

Every summer the C of E ordains its new deacons and priests.

The services are traditionally held during Petertide (29<sup>th</sup> June), a feast day that remembers the martyrdom of Saint Peter. He was the fisherman who became a devoted disciple of Jesus, and who then went on to be an instrumental figure in the early Church in Jerusalem.

Although the ordinations this summer will be held in a variety of cathedrals across the country, those being ordained will have certain important things in common:

They will have felt called by God to serve as a deacon or priest.

They will have passed a rigorous selection process.

They will have completed a two-to-three-year training course (diploma or degree) at one the of theological education institutes (TEIs) based around the country.

And so here they are now – called, accepted, trained and soon to be set apart for this specialised ministry. If you know a deacon or a priest, pray for them and their families this month, as they begin a lifetime of public service to God.

### **Understanding the Trinity**: Canon Paul Hardingham considers our Three-in-One God

Trinity Sunday has its place in our liturgical calendar (15<sup>th</sup> June), yet we do not often hear sermons on the Trinity. The term 'Trinity' isn't found in the Bible, and the Early Church took nearly 400 years to come up with a clear understanding of it.

However, there are hints of trinitarian language in the New Testament, e.g. Jesus instructs His disciples to baptise 'in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit' (Matt 28:19). Our understanding of the Trinity arises from God's activity in our world, as reflected in the creedal questions:

'Do you believe and trust in God the Father, source of all being and life, the One for whom we exist?

Do you believe and trust in God the Son, who took our human nature, died for us and rose again?

Do you believe and trust in God the Holy Spirit, who gives life to the people of God and makes Christ known in the world?

So why should the Trinity be important for us? If 'God is love' (1 John 4:8) it means that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are in a community of love together. Their relationship has been expressed as a divine dance, as they interact with one another, expressing love for each another and complementing the work each one has to do. As people made in God's image, we are called to live this community of love in our lives and churches.

The Trinity also provides the basis for our mission, 'As the Father has sent Me, so send I you.' Just as God the Father sent Jesus into the world, so Jesus sends us into the world to do the Father's work, equipped and accompanied by the Holy Spirit. In sharing God's love, we share the life of the Trinity. Augustine spoke about the Spirit being the love between God the Father and the Son.

'At the heart of reality lies the love between the Father and the Son. The Spirit unites us with Christ so that we begin to experience the same depth of love that exists between the Father and the Son.' (Graham Tomlin).

### A statement following the death of Pope Francis

The **Archbishop of York** has issued a statement following the news of the death of Pope Francis today. Here are excerpts from that statement:

"'Let us walk together, work together, pray together.' These are the words Pope Francis said to me when we met in 2023. They sum up his vision for the church, both the Roman Catholic Church but also ecumenically.

"Francis's whole life and ministry was centred on Jesus who comes among us, not to be served, but to serve. We saw that in Francis's service of the poor, his love of neighbour especially the displaced, migrant, the asylum seeker, his deep compassion for the well-being of the earth and his desire to build the church in new ways. Francis showed us how to follow Jesus, and encouraged us to go and do likewise.

"His encyclicals and teachings were supported by his deeds and actions. His whole life was instantly recognisable as those of one who followed Jesus.

"Pope Francis was acutely aware of the divisions between our churches, and I remember the powerful work he did with the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and the Moderator of the Church of Scotland in promoting peacebuilding in South Sudan.

"I remember, in the brief times I spent with him, how this holy man of God was also witty, lively, good to be with, and the warmth of his personality and interest in others shone out from him.

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

### Church grants scheme launched to kick start housing plans

Churches hoping to build affordable homes for their communities on pockets of land they own - or as part of schemes such as rebuilding parish halls- have been invited to apply for grants to pay for expert advice from a new £3.2 million fund.

Funding of up to £25,000 towards the cost of architect, consultant and other professional fees is available through the Church of England scheme.

The national initiative aims to help parishes and dioceses work towards achieving the goals set out in the Coming Home report, from the Archbishops' Commission on Housing, Church and Community. The landmark study called on the Church of England to lead by example in working to solve the housing crisis.


Now a newly formed Church of England Housing Project team is actively seeking parishes interested in developing such homes.

For example, an outdated church hall could be rebuilt to include a few flats above it, or a

surplus car park could be redeveloped to

provide some social homes.

As one of the team explained: "There are many creative ways to use church land or property to provide housing for people in need, whilst improving community facilities or bolstering parish finances."



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### 6<sup>th</sup> June - St Gudwal, the first Christian in Brittany?

If you would love to be in Brittany for your holiday this summer, then spare a thought for Gudwal, because this obscure 6<sup>th</sup> century Celtic abbot got there before you did. Indeed, Gudwal seems to have liked Brittany so much that he decided to stay on.

When you visit Brittany today, you will find Catholic churches everywhere. Not so in the sixth century – when only the extraordinary range of megalithic monuments dominated the landscape. There were (and still are) passage dolmens, stepped pyramids and stone circles. The best-known site is Carnac, where remains of a dozen rows of huge standing stones run for over ten kilometres. Some of the megalithic ruins in the gulf of Morbihan date back to at least 3300 BC – that is even older than Stonehenge.

Religion was certainly plentiful in Brittany back then. But Gudwal was one of the earliest pioneers of Christianity in the region. He did a bit of 6<sup>th</sup> century 'church planting', too - when he decided to build a hermitage in the middle of all that paganism – probably at Locoal. In time, 188 monks came to join him, and they built a little monastery.

But it was the man himself – his holiness and kindness – that drew people's attention more than the buildings.

### People who can't see should not drive!

So says a coroner, following a spate of four deaths caused by drivers who, in one case, could barely see his own steering wheel.

Dr James Adeley, the senior coroner for Lancashire, has said that letting motorists self-certify their fitness to drive is the 'laxest system in Europe', and is highly ineffective. And, until it is changed, road deaths will continue to be caused by drivers with failing eyesight.

Dr Adeley has sent a report to Heidi Alexander, the Transport Secretary, calling for action. He points out that the UK is one of only a handful of countries to use 'self-reporting' of any visual conditions that affect one's ability to drive.

Dr Adeley said: "The current system for 'ensuring drivers meet the visual legal standards is ineffective, unsafe and unfit to meet the needs of society."

The Department for Transport has responded: "The NHS recommends adults should have their eyes tested every two years and drivers are legally required to inform the DVLA if they have a condition which affects their eyesight.

### Our polluted water systems

Raw sewage continues to pour into our rivers and lakes. Water pollution is up by a third, with some 2,487 incidents recorded in the last year alone.

Last year, although firms were given an Environment Agency (EA) target of 40 per cent *reduction* in pollution incidents, instead such incidents rose by 30 per cent *more*. (Figures obtained under freedom of information laws.)

EA figures released in March showed that storm overflows spilled sewage into England's rivers, lakes and coasts for a new high of more than 3.61 *million* hours in 2024.

Meanwhile, water bills are going up by about £86 this year, and water companies face accusations of having let their critical infrastructure crumble over many years.

The Merchants of Doom are confounded! Their tales of decay are unfounded! The story is graphic as told by this traffic – Christ's Church is growing unbounded!



### Kitchener and that poster from the First World War by Tim Lenton

Some 175 years ago, on 24<sup>th</sup> June 1850, Herbert Kitchener, the 1<sup>st</sup> Earl Kitchener, was born. This Irish-born British Army officer and politician became Secretary of War during the First World War, when he appeared on an iconic poster asking people to join the army.

Kitchener already had a fearsome reputation, having been responsible for big colonial victories in Sudan and South Africa. He was very widely admired by the British people, though his cool personality and eagerness to push his men to the limit made him disliked by fellow officers. But he was also described as a godly man "who did noble deeds and obtained noble results".

He had been on leave in England in June 1914 when he reluctantly accepted an appointment to the Cabinet as Secretary of State for War and was promoted to Field Marshal. Most people expected a

short war, but Kitchener did not; he went about enlisting a great number of volunteers – a campaign symbolised for most people by Alfred Leete's poster using Kitchener's own face with the slogan 'Your country needs you'.

He organised British armies on a scale never seen before, but he was not to see victory. His life ended suddenly when he was drowned after the cruiser HMS Hampshire, taking him on a mission to Russia, was sunk in 1916 by a German mine. His body was never recovered, and the wreck is now a war grave. His death has been likened to the deaths of President Kennedy and Princess Diana – everyone remembered where they were when they heard the news.

A memorial fund launched by the Lord Mayor of London raised £500,000 to help war casualties and continues today. A Kitchener memorial was built by the people of Orkney on the cliff edge at Marwick Head.



### The ground-breaking marriage of Martin Luther by Tim Lenton

Five hundred years ago, on 13<sup>th</sup> June 1525, German Protestant Reformer Martin Luther married Katharina von Bora, a nun whom he had helped to escape from a convent.

Little is normally written about this phase of his life, but a great deal about him as a theologian and world-changing reformer in the Christian world, which he came to after studying law – a career encouraged by his father Hans, who had done well in copper-refining and was a town councillor.

Luther, however, was prompted by a frightening thunderstorm experience to enter the monastery in Erfurt of the Order of the Hermits of St. Augustine: he changed course and never looked back. The conflicts in which he became involved resulted from what he felt was a lack of spirituality stemming from Rome. His studies and conclusions about salvation as a work of divine grace, and his opposition in particular to indulgences, resulted eventually in the split of the Western church into Catholics and Protestants – of various kinds.

His marriage to Katharina came after he had helped her and several other nuns escape from her convent, hiding among fish barrels on a cart. The other nuns were taken in by their families or friends, but Katharina was left stranded. She refused other offers but was happy to marry Luther; he in turn was happy to marry her because he felt that marriage was honourable, and any insistence on clerical celibacy indefensible.

The marriage was warm and successful, and the couple had six children. Luther's wife proved to be a competent household manager and could hold her own theologically. But her husband's death in 1546, together with legal difficulties with his Will, left her in poverty, and she died six years later at the age of 53, after a fall.

### 15<sup>th</sup> June - Trinity Sunday, celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are *of* the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'

Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.



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
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

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### 21st June - Summer Solstice, longest day of the year

June, of course is the month of the summer solstice, the month of the Sun. *Sol + stice* come from two Latin words meaning 'sun' and 'to stand still'. As the days lengthen, the sun rises higher and higher until it seems to stand still in the sky.

The Summer Solstice results in the longest day and the shortest night of the year.

The Northern Hemisphere celebrates in June, and the Southern Hemisphere celebrates in December.

### THE CALL OF A BIRD

I guess we all need inspiration at times. But when I awoke this morning (27th May) it was an uninspiring sort of day. It was not quite raining but there was no doubt it was going to do so, the lady on the TV had predicted it.

I was not inspired by the thought of gardening. That task was fairly well up to date anyway. The armchair beckoned, I could just sit and read or even do a code word but I felt it was not good enough. It would have been so easy do nothing. Then a little self discipline kicked in, I would go for a bike ride to Fairlop Waters.



There was rain in the air as I set out. The lady on TV was right! I pushed on, somewhat stiffly and perhaps a little reluctantly until I reached the gravel paths of the country park. No motor traffic to worry about here, shrubs, grass and trees everywhere and then the almost magical sound of a cuckoo so soft and yet so distinctive against the background rustle and murmur of the wind in the trees and bushes.

It was surprising to know the miles from Africa that these birds fly just to lay their egg in the nest of a reed bunting, or the like. Me? I had only to cycle a couple of miles to get there while the cuckoo will have flown thousands of miles.

That was the cuckoo's business; mine was to cycle around the lake, a distance of 1.1 miles. Flocks of Canada geese inhabit whole areas, wandering over paths sometimes accepting offers of food from pedestrian visitors or grazing off the incredibly short grass. They get in the way of cyclists, waddling ungraciously aside, grumbling and grunting. Dog walkers also have to be aware of the geese.

Further on the people who had run the Bank Holiday Monday Fair were clearing away their apparatus, lighting compressors still running. Wonder how well they did for customers?

Not many people in and around the Boathouse Restaurant. The rain had become a steady drizzle by now. There would not be many people just wandering about in these conditions!

I continued on my circuit to the completion and headed for home in what was by now steady rain arriving home slightly more that damp, my waterproof jacket only partly keeping me dry.

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### Are bananas really good for you?

On the one hand, bananas offer good things. They count as one of your five a day, carry only about 90 calories, and are packed with the essential mineral potassium (good in lowering blood pressure.) But they are not perfect...

So, here are some pros and cons of bananas:

**Pro:** High in potassium, good for heart health, lowers blood pressure, has Vitamin C, helps digestion, provides energy, full of fibre, cholesterol-free.

**Cons:** Can raise potassium levels too much (avoid them if you have kidney disease), can lead to wind and bloating, cause blood sugar spikes, weight gain, and disrupt sleep.

Overall, experts recommend eating no more than two bananas a day.

### 25<sup>th</sup> June - Maximus of Turin, first Bishop of Turin

When many of us think of a 'Maximus', we remember the popular film *Gladiator* and Russell Crowe starring as a Roman general who ends up as a slave successfully defying the Emperor.

But Maximus of Turin, the first Bishop of Turin, also led a tumultuous life in fighting evil. He had seen violence and suffering when in 397 he witnessed the martyrdom of Sisinnius, Martyrius and Alexander, three missionary bishops in Italy.

The following year, 398, great trouble came to Northern Italy when it was swept by barbarian incursions. Turin soon filled up with soldiers and refugees seeking safety. Maximus challenged the wealthy landowners of the city to use their fine estates and houses to help relieve the suffering of those in need. He also told them not to seek profit from the unrest, but instead to use their wealth to redeem prisoners of war.

All in all, Maximus of Turin risked his own life to act as guardian of the city. One historian has recorded that he "governed his flock wisely and successfully" during those terrible days of invasion, widespread panic and death.

Remarkably, more than 100 of Maximus' sermons still survive. They reveal him to have been a passionate evangelist, standing up to rural paganism, and stressing the importance of Christians knowing their faith. His writings and sermons did much to help the spread and consolidation of Christianity in Northern Italy.

Maximus of Turin even has a link with us: he is thought to have consecrated St Patrick as Bishop, on Patrick's return journey from Rome to Ireland.





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

### **Sweets**



### 11,000 people take part in consultations for the next Archbishop of Canterbury

More than 11,000 people have so far participated in the consultations for the next Archbishop of Canterbury. It was carried out online, by post and in person between February and March this year.

The public consultation was a unique opportunity to influence the future of leadership within the Church, helping to discern the gifts, skills and qualities that will be required in the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury, to meet the needs of the Church today and in the years to come.

The themes that emerge through this consultation will sit alongside the 'Statement of Needs' produced by the Diocese of Canterbury, as well as other information provided by the National Church and Anglican Communion. This information will inform the Canterbury Crown Nominations Commission of the needs of the mission of the Church of England and the wider Anglican Communion.

### Open Farm Sunday – 17<sup>th</sup> June

Do you have any farms near to where you live?

Then this month, they might just provide you with an interesting day out!

For June brings Open Farm Sunday, which can be a "fab-u-lous oppor-tu-ni-ty for the public to dis-cov-er the cru-cial work farm-ers do in produc-ing food, nur-tur-ing nature, and pro-tecting the envi-ron-ment for future generations."

So says the website, <a href="www.farmsunday.org">www.farmsunday.org</a>.
And on the day, nearly 200 farms throughout the country will be welcoming the public to come and see their farms.

### How many steps a day is enough?

Counting steps has, for many of us, become a part of our lives. We feel triumphant when we hit 10,000, and guilty when we notch up less than 2,000 a day.

But daily steps, which are really no more than regular daily exercise, are not just a gimmick.

Medical research has found that your daily step count, especially when taken over years, really can make a huge difference to your health and life expectancy. The Government's official statistics cite physical inactivity as responsible for one in six otherwise preventable deaths.

So how many steps do you need to achieve different levels of protection?

2,000 to 3,000 steps a day – or just over a mile. This can help reduce your risk of heart disease.

4,000 to 5,000 steps – can reduce risk of chronic disease and helps reduce risk of cognitive decline. (People who walked this far were found to have a 25 per cent lower risk of dementia.) As a scientist at the European University of Madrid, said: "This is likely because of improved blood flow to the brain, reduced brain inflammation, better metabolism of glucose in the brain, and an increase in beneficial brain chemicals which stimulate neuron growth."

7,000 to 8,000 steps, about three miles, can provide a 31 per cent lower risk of depression, and it can also lower your risk of cardiovascular disease by 51 per cent.

10,000 steps - about five miles, achieves a wide range of health benefits. But even just 8,800 steps a day has been found to reduce risk of premature death from many diseases by 60 per cent.

As a scientist at the University of Sydney explained: "It's about setting initial targets that are achievable, and then gradually working your way up to more daily steps, as you build up your capacity to handle more activity."

Like Father, Like Son Fathers' Day is the third Sunday in June...

'Dead Ringer' is the odd phrase we use when referring to someone who looks like somebody else. Sometimes, instead, we say 'spitting image' when we see a likeness or similarity between one person and another.

This month includes Fathers' Day (15th June) and is an occasion when dads are particularly remembered by their children. As far as the boys are concerned, how many have heard someone say 'Oh, you really look like your father'?

One day, Jesus was talking to His disciples and said, "Whoever has seen m Me has seen the Father" (Jn 14:9) What an amazing statement! Jesus was saying that He was the dead ringer or spitting image of God! At another time Jesus said, "I am in the Father and the Father is in Me." (Jn 14.10) These words must have shocked His hearers, for He was saying that He was equal with God. No one had said anything like this before, but certainly His miracles were proof that He was different. No-one else could do what He was doing. Some people wondered—could He really be who He said He was?

So Jesus attempted to make His position clear and said, "If you knew Me you would know the Father also." (Jn 8:19) The people were being urged to know Jesus more. They had to look, listen and believe. Were His deeds of God or not? They had to decide!

Today, we all stand in a similar position. Who is Jesus? Do we look at Him and say 'Yes, this is God in the flesh' or 'No, He was just a good person — but also perhaps, deluded or crazy?'

Thomas, the disciple with the nickname 'doubter', exclaimed: "My Lord and *my God*" (Jn 20:28). Thomas was convinced that he was in the presence of God, in human form. And when the Apostle Paul wrote to the church at Colossae he said clearly: 'It was by God's own decision that the Son has in Himself the full nature of God' (*Colossians 1:19*). **Like Father, like Son!** 

### **MONEY MATTERS**

For 2024, our **planned giving**: that is via the Parish Giving Scheme; Free Will Offering Envelopes; Standing Order; plus, gift aid recovered; stood at £42,645. While this is a consistent level of support, it continues to be significantly below the **Parish** Share commitment, which for 2024 was £65,733 and to which we were only able to contribute £55,000.

This left us facing a shortfall of £12,355 in regular giving against even the <u>lower pledge</u>, let alone the full quota share, which is a key obligation to the Diocese.

### Parish Share

The Parish Share funds clergy stipends, housing, training for ministry, and other central support services. Meeting this commitment in full is vital to sustaining both our local ministry and the wider mission of the Church of England. The present shortfall places pressure on our broader financial resources and limits our ability to invest in outreach, maintenance, and future growth and importantly to help other churches in the Diocese which are struggling.

### **Number of Givers**

As at the end of 2024, 23 people gave regularly using one of the above-mentioned means and contribute, on a rolling 12 month average, £45,876 before gift aid is reclaimed.

For **2025** our Parish Share has increased to **£67,583** and this will mean a shortfall against the regular giving made in 2024 of **£21,707**. As at the end of 2024 there were eighty-three people on the **Electoral Roll** versus 23 regular givers, a delta of 60 people. If the shortfall of £21,707 is divided equally between these 60 people, then this would amount to £362 per person each year, £30 each month, or £8 each week - the price of two coffees.

Whilst we understand, and very much appreciate, that many people give by donating to the plate as and when they attend and when they can afford, this makes it difficult to budget for high energy costs and the Parish Share and hence it would be really helpful if those of you signing up to this year's electoral roll would consider pledging to give a regular amount, however small.

### 29th June - Feast of SS Peter & Paul, the two most famous apostles

### St Peter, 'the Rock'

The two most famous apostles are remembered this month, for they share a feast day. St Peter (d. c. 64AD), originally called Simon, was a married fisherman from Bethsaida, near the Sea of Galilee. He met Jesus through his brother, Andrew. Jesus gave him the name of Cephas (Peter) which means rock. Peter is always named first in the list of apostles. He was one of the three apostles who were privileged to witness the Transfiguration, the raising of the daughter of Jairus, and the Agony in the Garden.

When Peter made his famous confession of faith, that Jesus was the Christ, Jesus recognised it as being the result of a revelation from the Father. He in turn told Peter that he would be the rock on which His Church would be built, that the 'gates of hell' would never prevail against it. Peter and the apostles would have the power of 'binding and loosing', but Peter would be personally given 'the keys of the kingdom of heaven'. Jesus also forewarned Peter of his betrayal and subsequent strengthening of the other apostles. After His Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Peter before the other apostles, and later entrusted him with the mission to feed both the lambs and the sheep of Christ's flock.

Peter played a big part in the early Church, and he is mentioned many times in the Book of Acts, where in the early chapters he organised the choice of Judas' successor, preached with stirring authority at Pentecost; and was the very first apostle to work a miracle. Peter went on to defend the apostles' right to teach at the Sanhedrin, and to condemn Ananias and Sapphira. It was Peter who first realised that Christianity was also for the Gentiles, after his meeting with Cornelius. Later he took a prominent part in the council at Jerusalem and went on to clash with St Paul at Antioch for hesitating about eating with Gentiles.

Early tradition links Peter with an apostolate and martyrdom at Rome. The New Testament does not tell us either way, but Peter being in Rome would make sense, especially as Peter's first epistle refers to 'Babylon', which was usually identified with Rome. Peter's presence in Rome is mentioned by early church fathers such as Clement of Rome and Irenaeus. Tradition also tells us that Peter suffered under Nero and was crucified head-downwards. There is no conclusive proof either way that St Peter's relics are at the Vatican, but it is significant that Rome is the only city that ever claimed to be Peter's place of death.

St Peter was a major influence on Mark when writing his gospel, and the First Epistle of Peter was very probably his. (Many scholars believe that the Second Epistle was written at a later date.)

From very early times Peter was invoked by Christians as a universal saint. He was the
